

Executive Summary

ODH-confirmed COVID-19 cases, hospitalizations, and deaths continued to trend upward. According to ODH, 1,354 (+140) of the 4,782 (+332) confirmed cases are currently hospitalized. The five day average of those hospitalized being admitted to the Intensive Care Unit is 31 per day.

Six Alternate Care Site locations have been selected for state establishment (Lucas, Montgomery, Hamilton, Franklin, Mahoning, and Cuyahoga Counties), with additional potential sites across the state being evaluated for final approval. Potential locations continue to be evaluated by the Joint Engineering Assessment Teams (led by Ohio National Guard) to determine final suitability.

State EOC Workgroups continue to plan and support County EMA medical surge needs, to include increasing medical and mortuary service capacity, addressing personal protective equipment needs, quarantine, and congregate care needs.

Homelessness

Purpose: To develop guidance and support for local communities as they support the distinct needs of these Ohioans and the staff at congregate care facilities.

Update: Due to the potential risk of exposure to COVID-19 and increased vulnerability, we must take swift action to address growing needs and prevent over saturation of our healthcare system, specifically for; literally homeless, precariously housed, and persons residing in congregate settings. Plan to include behavioral health recommendations to Quarantine and Isolation Planning Working with the transportation group to consider special needs in transporting these patients or persons in the community. Continuing to provide trauma informed care training to responders.

Workgroup Details: Lead Agency: Ohio Mental Health and Addiction Services Participating Partners: Coalition of Homelessness and Housing in Ohio, Ohio Housing Finance Agency, Governor's Office, Ohio EMA, Department of Developmental Disabilities, Ohio Development Services Agency

Mass Fatality

Purpose: To assemble stakeholders within mass fatality/fatality management to develop statewide strategies and unified effort in the management of decedents.

Update: Discussed current progress on objectives. Clarification was identified as being needed on the federal request for DMORT. The mass fatality workgroup will be reconvening today to discuss progress on plan development and other planning initiatives.

Medical Surge

Purpose: Planning for needs to address forecast Medical Surge needs. Alternate Care Site Support in support of Med Surge

Update: Continues to coordinate and implement Alternate Care Site plan to meet facility, equipment, staffing, and process needs. Currently conducting assessment of potential ACS locations. County EMAs, local health partners, and state-led Engineer Assessment Teams are coordinating site assessment and approval. Recommended sites are being submitted to the State EOC for final approval.

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Workgroup Details: Lead Agency: Ohio Department of Health Participating Partners: Ohio National Guard, ESF-4, Ohio EMA Regional Office

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Personal Protective Equipment

Purpose: To determine and allocate appropriate PPE for COVID-19 responders.

Update: The group has established a list of needed PPE to acquire through donation or procurement. An initial plan for allotment of donated resources has been approved. A PPE tracking form is being developed and will be provided following its approval. A daily 15 minute sync has been established to supplement current meeting times.


