

Executive Summary

Over the past 24 hours, the Ohio Department of Health reported 656 (131,992) total new cases, eight (3,042) ICU admissions, 22 (4,298) deaths, and 80 (13,967) hospitalizations.

State stockpiling and storage strategies continue to be developed through ESF-7 and the State EOC Unified Command. Warehouse capacity continues to be monitored as inbound supplies increase; ODH reports the Adelaide Warehouse operational and 40% of its rack space in use.

State Community Lifeline Status

Primary Lifeline

- Total confirmed cases, deaths, and hospitalizations continue to increase.
- Very high exposure and spread conditions have been identified in seven counties by ODH
- Limited access to nursing homes and similar facilities continues.
- Personal Protective Equipment, Mass Fatality, and Medical Surge workgroups continue efforts.
- Two active RRF remains in-progress; 13 addressed and are no longer active.



- The Agriculture workgroup continues to monitor for issues of concern.
- Non-congregate sheltering planning and response continues.
- (Potential guarantine locations) have been identified.
- Homelessness workgroup continues to collaborate on response.



- First Responders have access to information on who has tested positive for COVID-19. (ODH Order)
- Limited access to jails & detention facilities continues.
- ODRC staff and incarcerated populations continue to test positive across their statewide facilities.



• No current impacts to the lifeline requiring EOC support.

- 1. Coordinate the State's response to limit COVID-19 spread and maintain Lifeline stability.
- 2. Provide mission support to identify, prevent, mitigate and respond to COVID-19 hot spots.

- Mass Fatality branch mobilized 1 mobile cooling unit to Clermont County to support a local funeral home that was reporting a surge.
- ESF-8 participated in the FEMA Region V Synchronization Meeting where the following topics were discussed:
 - Title 32 planning
 - KN95s supplies
 - Ask for additional vaccine planning information.

- ODRC Special Operations team members working at Chillicothe Correctional Institution and Allen Correctional Institution for a security mission and Allen Correctional Institution for medical missions.

- o Ohio EMA participated in the County Partners COVID-19 Call.
- o The FEMA Public Assistance Program has been declared for COVID-19.

 There are currently 759 applicants and 127 active projects under the program.

Actions Taken:

- o COVID-19 Pop-Up Testing today in Cincinnati and Springfield.
- Notes from Governor's and Lt. Governor's 2 pm Briefing:
 - Gov. DeWine spoke with Ohio State President Kristina Johnson on COVID-19 testing, contact tracing. OSU tests weekly, three groups: On-campus students, Off-campus students, and OSU staff/employees. Positivity rate is coming down with messaging and participation of wearing masks and staying social distanced.
 - Gov. DeWine reported on gun violence in Ohio. From September 1 to September 7, 40 people were shot; more than half have died.
 - Ohio COVID-19 Cases: 131,992 with 656 positive cases reported over the last 24 hours. Total Ohio deaths: 4,298 with 22 deaths reported over the last 24 hours
 - Top 10 Ohio Counties: Putnam, Butler, Meigs, Mercer, Montgomery, Shelby, Auglaize, Darke, Franklin, and Henry.
 - Dr. Aaron Hamilton, Cleveland Clinic's Associate Chief Safety & Quality Officer discussed what Ohioans should consider when deciding whether or not to attend an event.
 - Gov. DeWine addressed the internet rumor on the Non-Congregate Sheltering Order. On March 31, President Trump declared a major disaster declaration for the state of Ohio. The order was renewed on April 29 and again on August 31. The Non-Congregate Sheltering Order does not create FEMA camps. The sheltering order provides a safe space (such as hotel rooms) for individuals to use to self-quarantine, when needed. For example: first responders who work in a COVID environment and don't want to risk taking the disease home and exposing their families. "Bottom line: Neither FEMA nor the Department of Health are going to set up 'FEMA camps' for anyone to quarantine against their will. What we are doing is making available a safe place for people to state when they have loved ones they are trying to protect and they have no other place to go."


